Key Message To All Parents And Carers

School Values: Respect, Inclusion, Responsibility, Empathy

Unfortunately, we are increasingly having some parents approaching children who are not their own, or parents/carers of the child directly to reprimand where they believe there is an issue between them and their child. When parents approach other parents or children not their own, the issue becomes complex and very time consuming for school staff to then have to deal with. It escalates any perceived issues quickly, causing personal gripes between parents which then exacerbates issues between children.

Some children involved may have special educational needs who need to be handled with sensitivity and for whom adjustments to the behaviour policy application applies. Understanding the full context of a child and the context of the situation is key and school staff have this or are able to ascertain this to assist with a resolution.

Please could we ask all parents/carers to report concerns, friendship or behaviour issues to school staff only to deal with and resolve. Please do not approach other people's children and other parents directly or via social media to address friendship or behaviour issues; it is not acceptable. Please speak to an appropriate member of staff to investigate the issue objectively in line with school policies.

Thank you for support to ensure that our school values are upheld, that adult behaviour is of the highest standard for the children, this will ensure that children and adults within our school community feel safe.

Governor News

As Chris Bass, Vice Chair, mentioned in the last Governor update, the non-staff Governors recently spent the day in school. This was an opportunity for us to undertake monitoring of actions against the School Strategic Plan (SSP) and immerse ourselves in school life. Visits, like this one, are an integral part of the Governor's role as it enables us to triangulate the data (school and external) we discuss in our Full Governing Body (FGB) meetings with what we observe first hand.

As a new member of the FGB, it was a fantastic opportunity for me to see, and experience, the school in action. I was impressed by the quality of the teaching, breadth of the curriculum, the engagement of pupils and the overall culture of the school. I loved hearing from pupils about the recent visit to the Houses of Parliament, taking part in a Movement Break and learning a thing or two about Megacities in a Geography lesson. Following this visit, myself and the other Governors remain satisfied that school is well placed to deliver against the SSP.

Finally, I wanted to say a huge thank you to the teachers and the pupils who engaged openly and honestly throughout the visit and to wish you all a well-deserved Easter break.

The Landscape Project

Ready for Spring and the warmer weather (which we must all now be dreaming of as the rain comes down again!), a poly tunnel will be installed over the Easter holidays for children to be able to grow vegetables and fruits. This will be placed alongside the five fruit trees that have been planted this term at the rear of the

Year 3 block. In addition, there will be six new planters placed in the court yard area to expand growing opportunities. Year 3 will be using these spaces to grow their own salads as part of their design and technology cooking unit in the summer term. Gardening Club have also been busy planting seeds, ready to be transplanted into the beds as temperatures increase.

Children have enjoyed exploring the woodland area with their wellies over the last few weeks. Next term, all children will spend time reading stories in this space whilst appreciating the beauty of nature and fresh air. Look out for the Year 6 design and technology projects that will be placed in this area including bug hotels, bird houses and hedgehog houses to promote and support wildlife.

Are you growing any vegetables at home?

We already have selection of seedlings that will be potted on when they are large enough. We would be particularly grateful if you have any surplus seedlings that we could continue to care for at school. If you do, please send them to school with your child after the Easter break and children will do their very best to care for them. Children will report on our vegetable growing experiences after the summer!

Children's Mental Health and Wellbeing

It has been another successful term at Hook, with many opportunities being provided for pupils, this includes weekly visits from Clare and Dennis of Caine Assisted Learning (Dennis is a border terrier!).

As a school, it is a service we are very lucky to have and it has great impact for our pupils, who require this support. We also have provided a range of pastoral interventions to support pupils who need them including ELSA, Morning Mindfulness Groups, Lego Therapy, Managing Emotions Groups as well as many more.

As the warmer weather approaches, in the Summer term, we hope to make good use of beautiful school grounds. Gardening Club have been working hard over the Autumn and Spring term, planting bulbs, weeding, growing seedlings, planting fruit trees (kindly donated by Oz) and prepping our woodland area. They are looking forward to the whole school benefiting from all their hard work. Well Done Gardening Club!

Special Educational Needs

At Hook Junior School, our children are at the centre of everything we do. We aim to identify the needs of all pupils as early as possible. This is part of our graduated approach, in which we Assess, Plan, Do, Review. This ongoing cycle ensures that effective provision is put in place and also removes barriers to learning. We have a range of interventions taking place daily in our school to meet the needs of all of our children. We believe in inclusivity for all and strive to make this a reality for all our pupils.

Year 3

What an 'eggcellent' Easter service the children did on Wednesday 27th March! Everyone learned their lines, played their part with enthusiasm and the high expectations shone through! They were a credit to the school.

The children have been excited writing their letters to our local PM Ranil Jayawardena, informing him of the damage to our local environment. They have enjoyed forming their letters and are excited to redraft and send them off!

During their Geography lessons, the children have been studying Megacities. In this they have been looking at features of different settlements, where these Megacities are found on a map and comparing and contrasting them to our closest Megacity – London. The children are excited about their school trip early in the Summer term; viewing the London skyline ready to apply it to their art topic next term.

Year 4

During this past term the children in Year 4 visited the Mary Rose Museum in Portsmouth and were assets to the school. They had such a great time exploring the museums and finding out lots of interesting facts – applying this to their learning in History.

The children have been creative in designing, creating and evaluation their own pencil cases. It was such a joy to see so many parents helping out in the afternoon, working collaboratively to complete the pencil cases. We hope the children enjoy filling these up during the Easter break and putting them to good use!

We highly recommend using the website 'Times Table Rockstars' (https://ttrockstars.com/) as a fun and engaging way for your child to improve and practice these skills. We suggest having the children practice in the 'Soundcheck' section, as this will be similar to the MTC and the time allowed for each question.

World Book Day was celebrated at the beginning of March with the launch of the Spring reading challenge. Don't forget to keep encouraging your child to read regularly this Easter. It could be books, newsletters, newspapers or reading and following cooking instructions.

Year 5

It has been another positive term in Year 5. The children continue to work exceptionally hard and it had been a pleasure witnessing their personal growth, academic achievements, and engagement in their learning.

In reading and writing, the children explored Secrets of a Sun King by Emma Carroll. They demonstrated exceptional skill by writing from the perspective of Lillian, also known as 'Lil', as she discovered an ancient antechamber. Additionally, their non-chronological report on their chosen river animal showcased their research skills, scientific understanding, and ability to present information in a structured manner.

Notably, they have excelled in their swimming lessons, honing their physical skills and water confidence. Additionally, the Young Shakespeare Company's performance of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' allowed them to immerse themselves in the world of Shakespearean theatre and storytelling.

The children also had the opportunity to display their musical talents during their class Ukulele learning events. This experience has not only introduced them (and some adults) to a new instrument but has also nurtured their creativity and musical expression.

Year 6



Year 6 children have shown tremendous growth and dedication to their studies, resulting in another successful term.

We have witnessed children continue to refine and perfect their writing skills. They produced informative Daily Cog Newspaper articles as well as useful non-chronological reports based on their own mechanism. Their commitment to honing their writing skills is truly commendable, and we have been so pleased to see their dedication towards improving and expressing their creativity through writing.

The children have also have preparing for their upcoming SATs, where they have displayed remarkable work ethics and determination. Their hard work and dedication have been truly impressive, and I have no doubt this will continue next term

In addition to this, Year 6 have actively engaged in a range of curriculum-based learning opportunities such as, the Natural History Museum workshop, a visit from the Young Shakespeare company who performed 'A Midsummer Nights' Dream' as well as the Think Safe Event. We ended the term with a fantastic Learning event, where the children decorated and evaluated their wildlife shelters.

Attendance

A huge well done to the 68 children from across the school who have 100% attendance for the year to date. It is particularly impressive to see several sets of siblings on this 100% list.

Our current whole school attendance is 95.8% which is slightly down on our yearly target of around 96.7%. We hope that the warmer weather and Easter holidays will see a much-needed break to the various tummy bugs and coughs / colds we have unfortunately seen across the school this term.

Regular attendance as you know, is very important for children to achieve the best they can. If children are absent from school, it not only affects their education but they will miss out on the social side of school which affects their ability to make and keep friends. There is a direct link between the attainment of pupils and different levels of absence. Data from the Department for Education shows that pupils with higher attainment at KS2 and KS4 have lower levels of absence over the key stage compared to those with lower attainment.

Behaviour

As a school community, we are particularly delighted to receive many positive comments from visitors about the behaviour and manners of our children.

Learning about how to behave positively towards others and to make good decisions for ourselves, both physically and emotionally, is entwined across our whole curriculum. Everyone is expected to adhere to our high expectations. These include: our attitudes towards academic work; being prepared for school by being in correct uniform, completing homework; and punctual.

At Hook Junior School we believe that teaching children positive behaviour is the basis for success and happiness in life and as part of society. We recognise it is the responsibility of all adults in school to model, identify, celebrate and advise on behaviour in a constructive, positive manner.

We use 'Restorative Practice' to help children to develop an ability to reflect on their behaviour choices, how they may have hurt themselves and others and how to behave in a more positive way in the future.

Our school Golden Rules and rewards are visible, attainable, consistent, valued and understood by adults and pupils. The Golden Rules are an integral part of life at Hook Junior School.


Avenue Dance Easter Dance Camp






